a deal for you...!"**

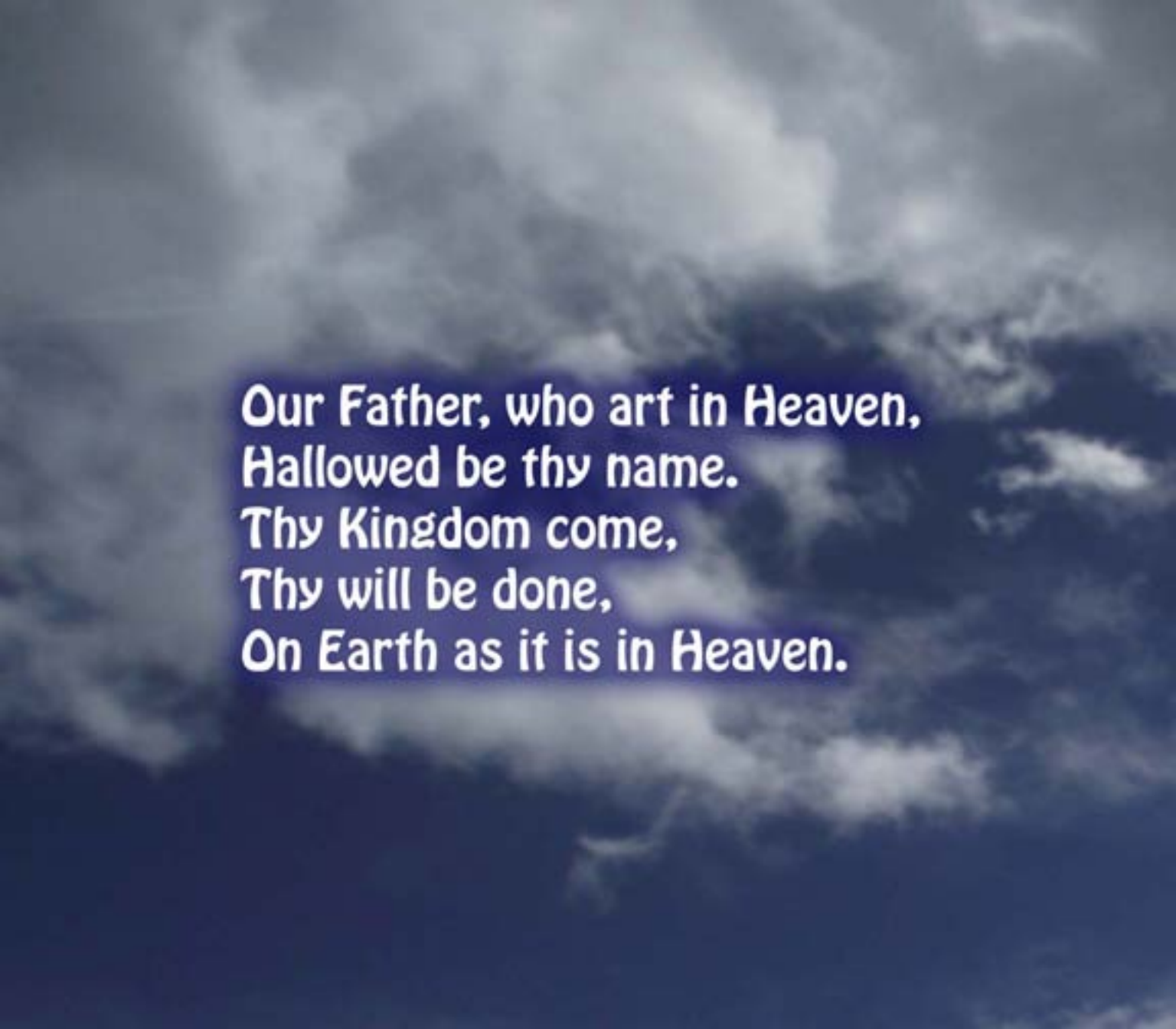
**"You need to talk to God
as a child would talk to his father."**



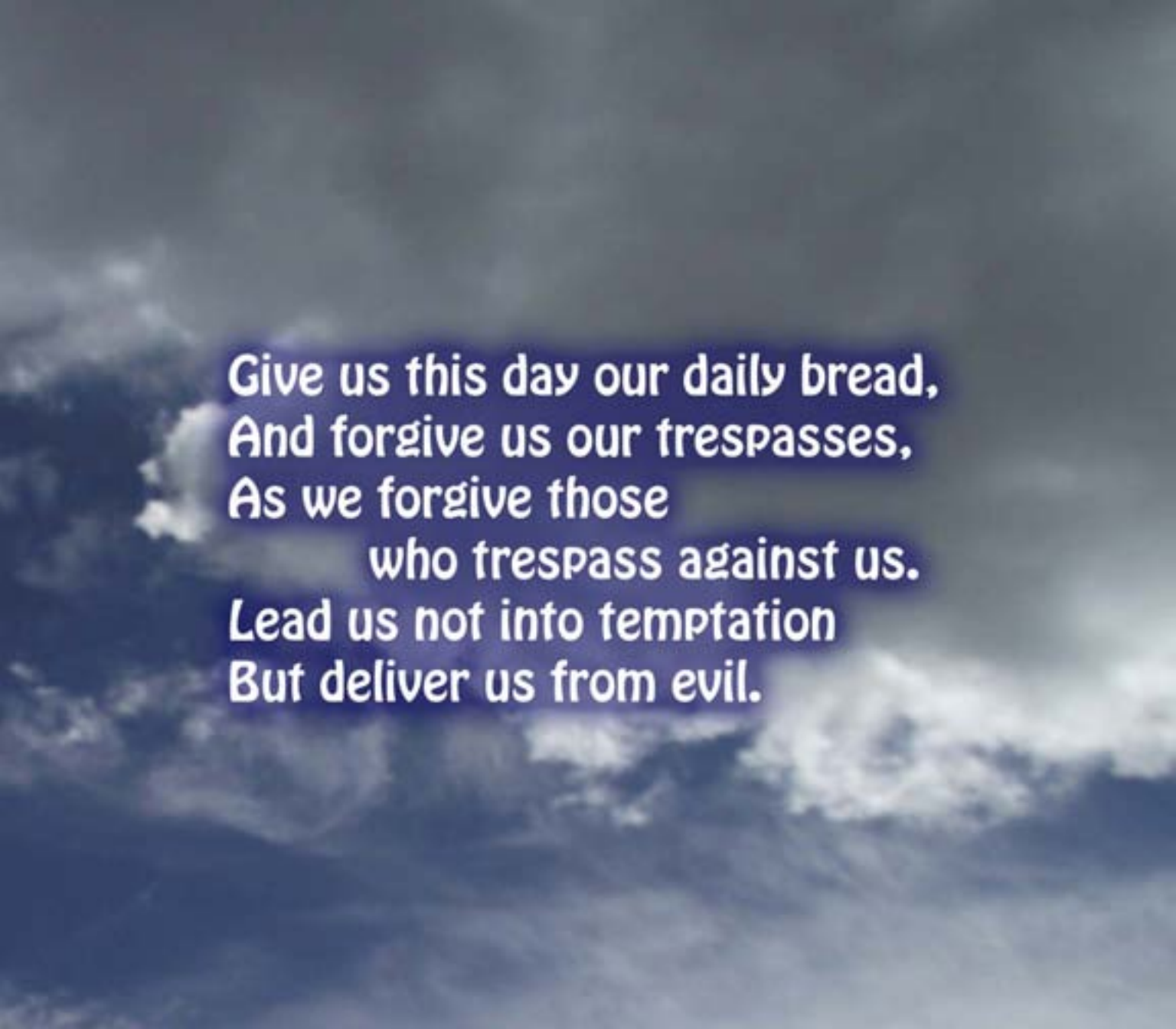

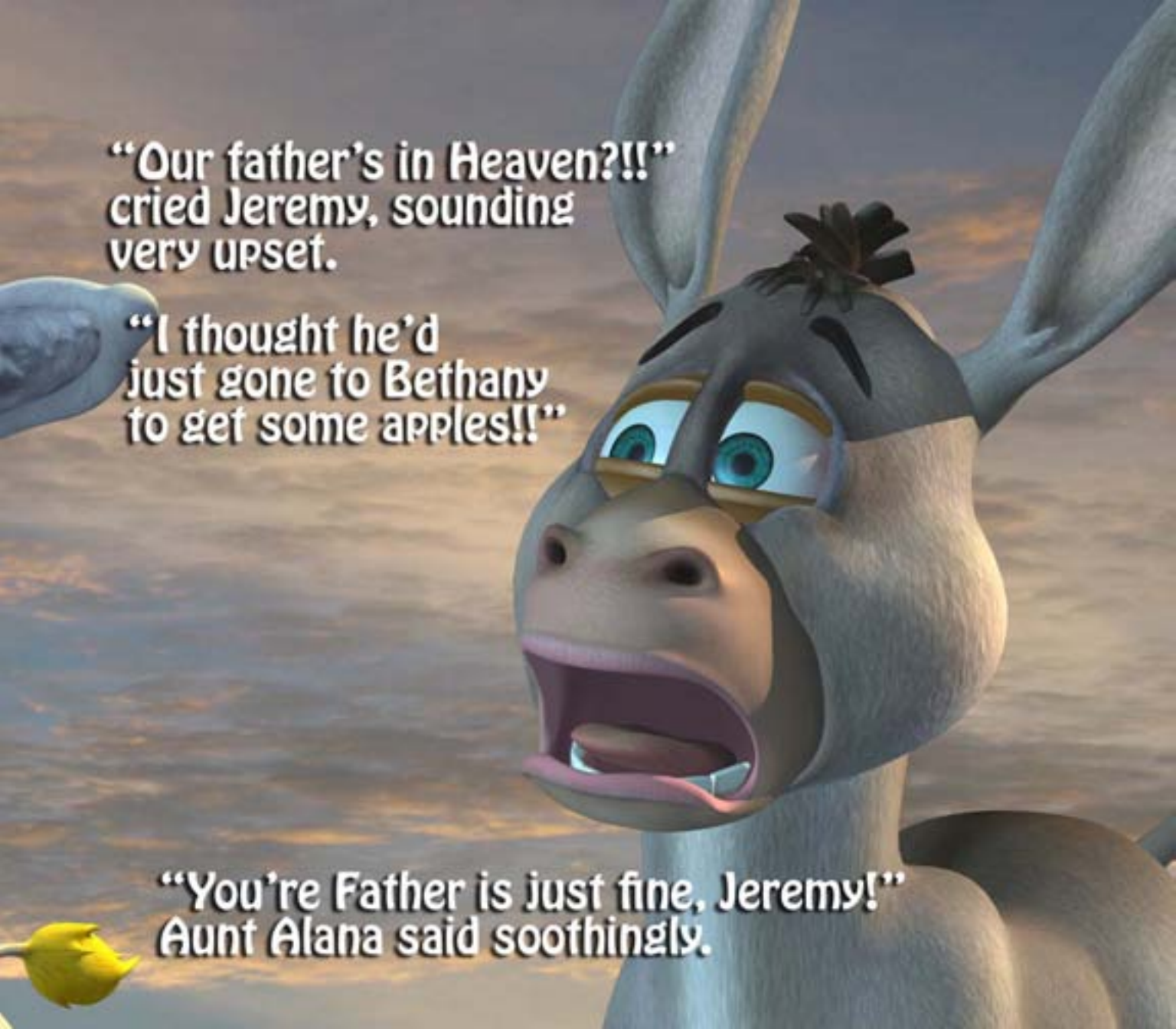
**"It's called The Lord's Prayer,"

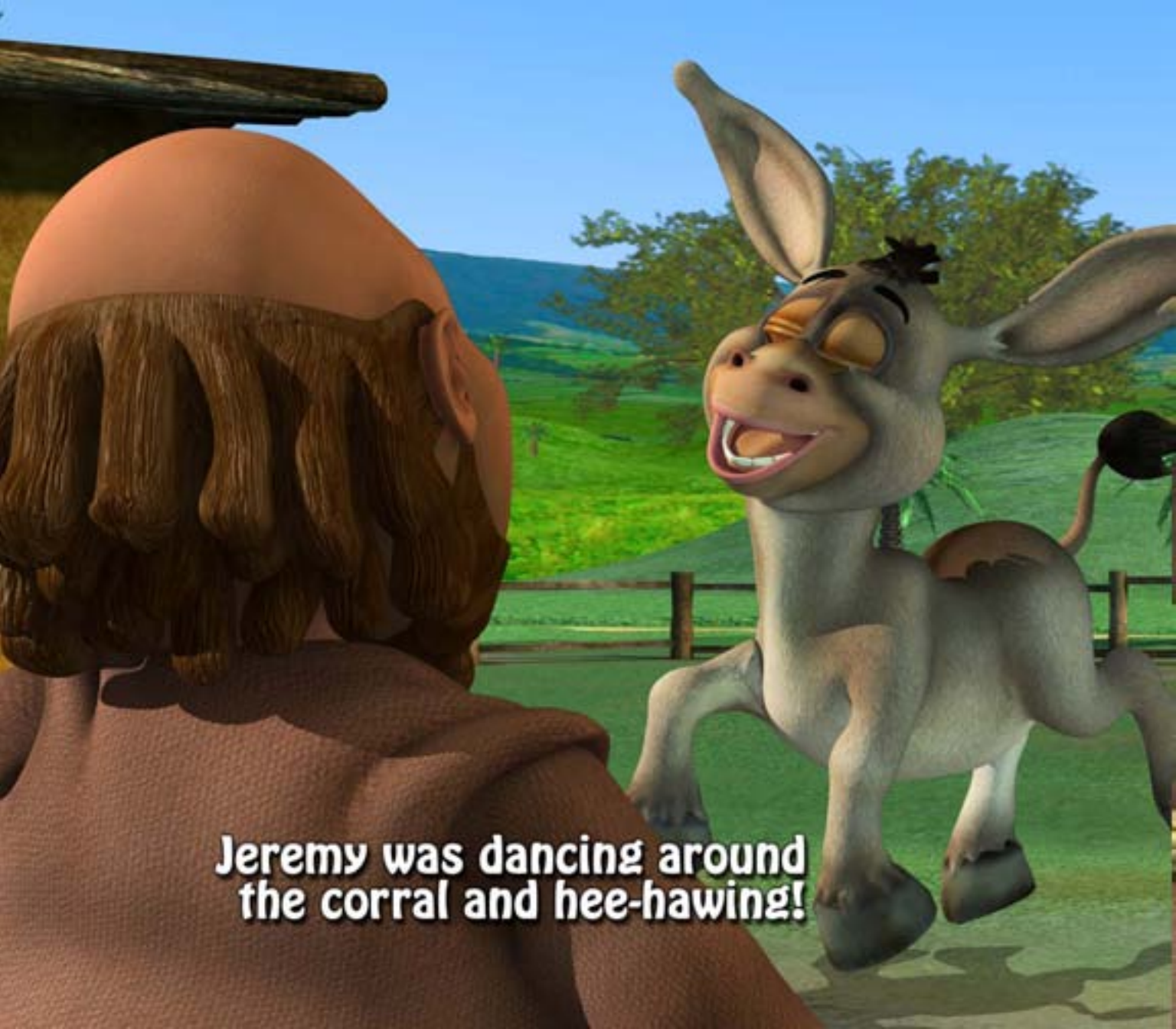

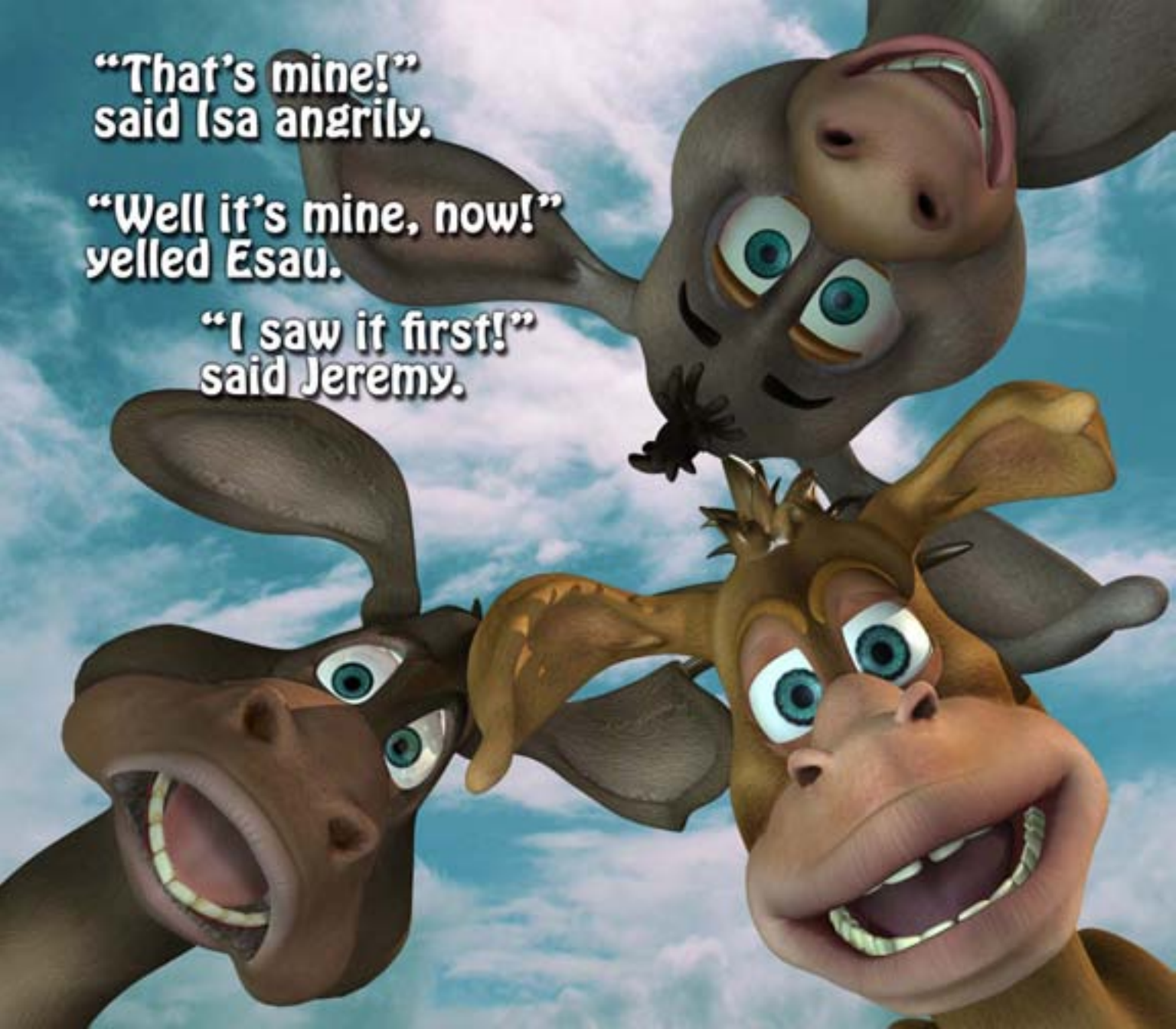

“That’s a good question, Ollie!” said Farmer John. “Keep in mind, though, that God gave us free will.”



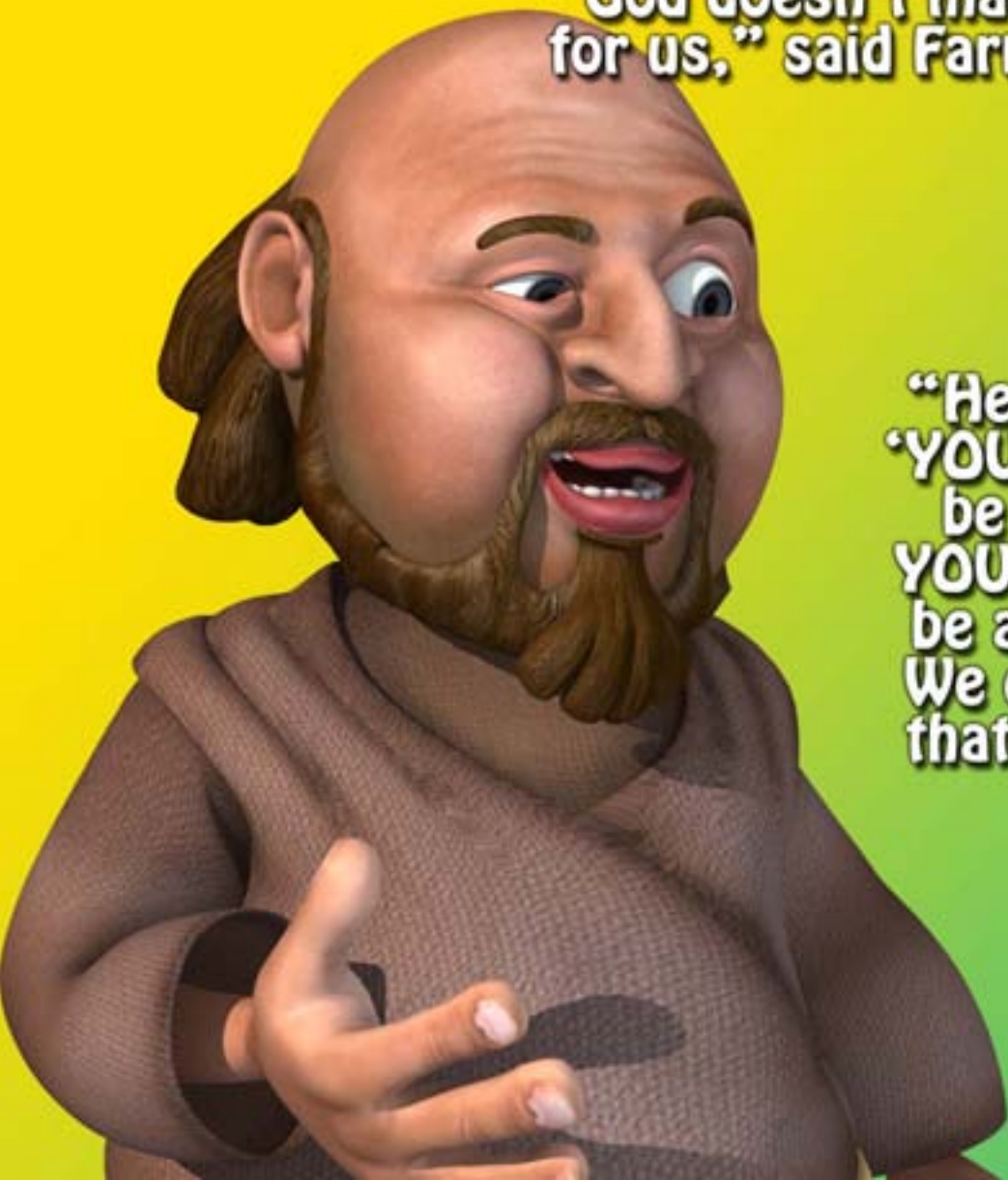
“Free will?” asked Ollie.

that ourselves.”**

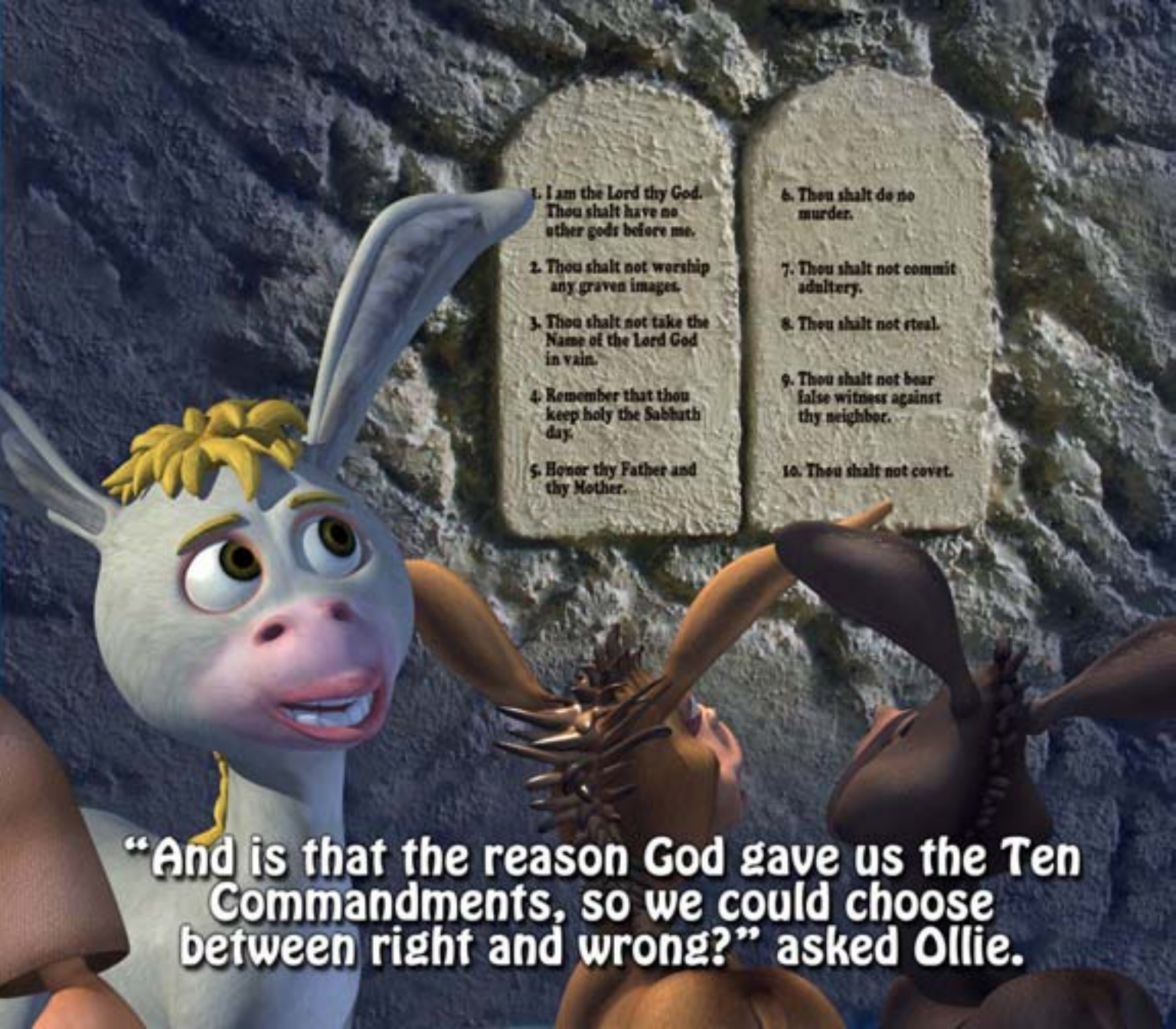




“So,” said Ollie,

Farmer John.**



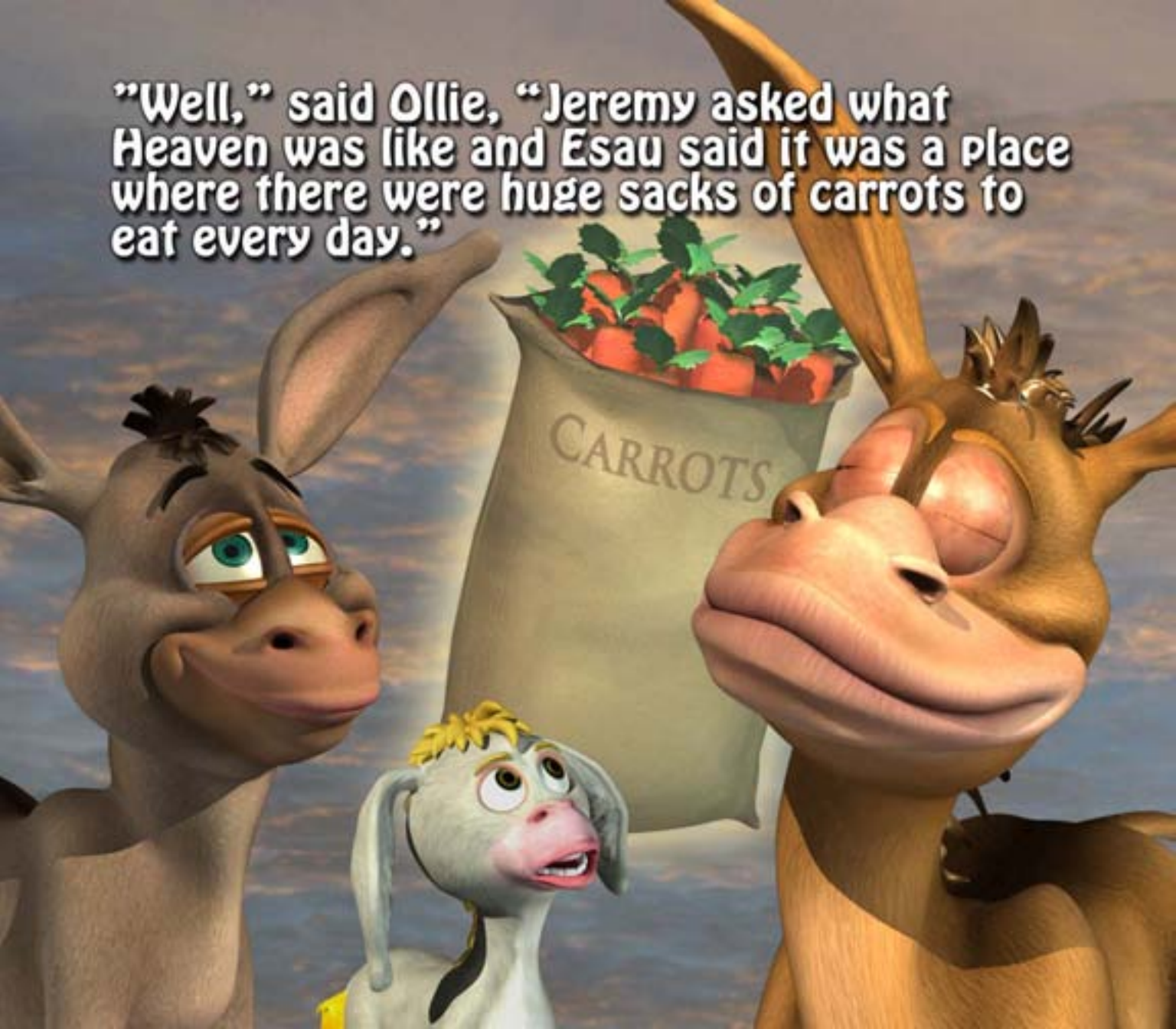
“No, that part was pretty simple,” said Ollie.

"Well," said Ollie, "Jeremy asked what Heaven was like and Esau said it was a place where there were huge sacks of carrots to eat every day."

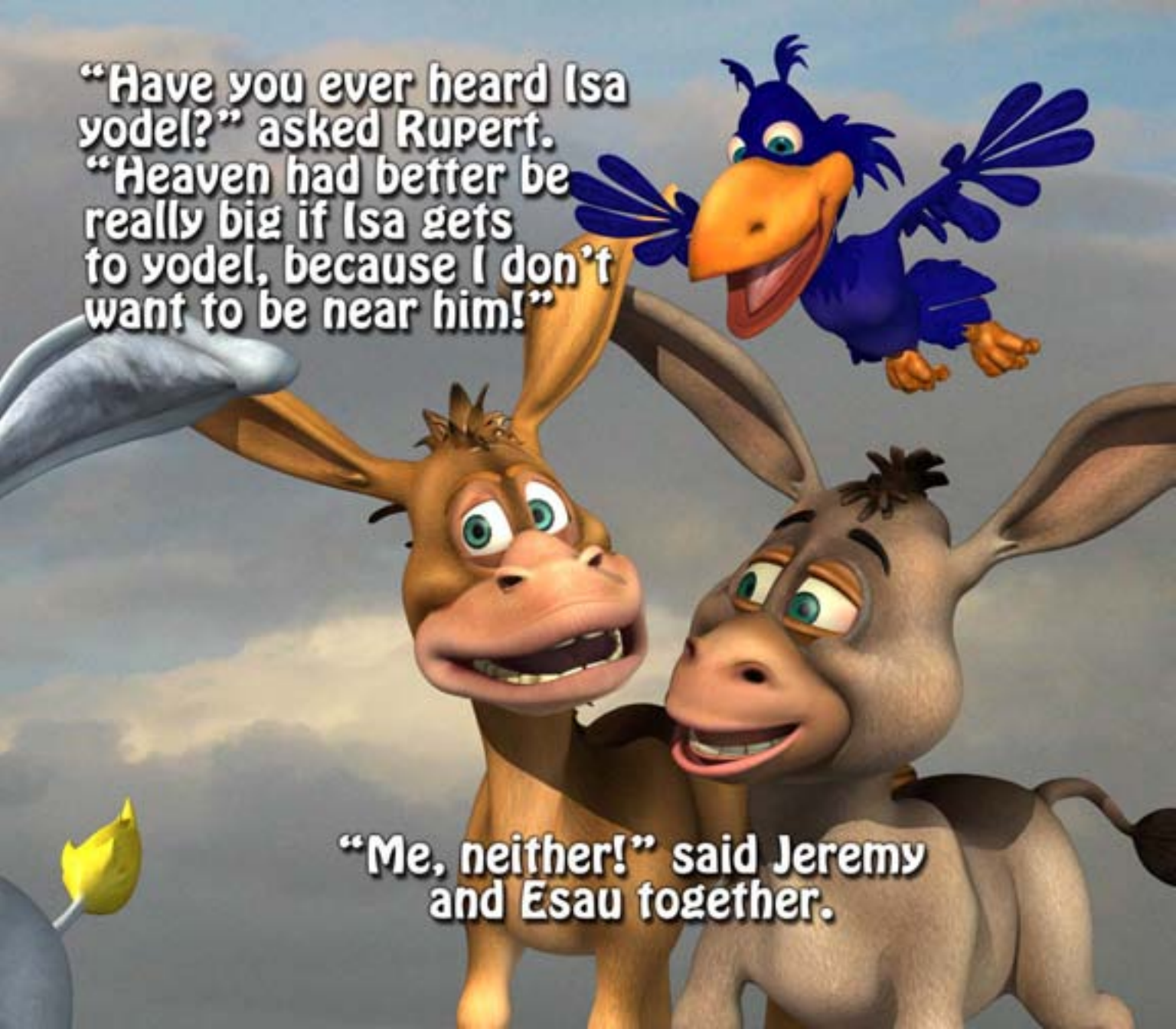




**"I told him he was wrong," said Rupert.

sang Jeremy as he danced in the corral.**

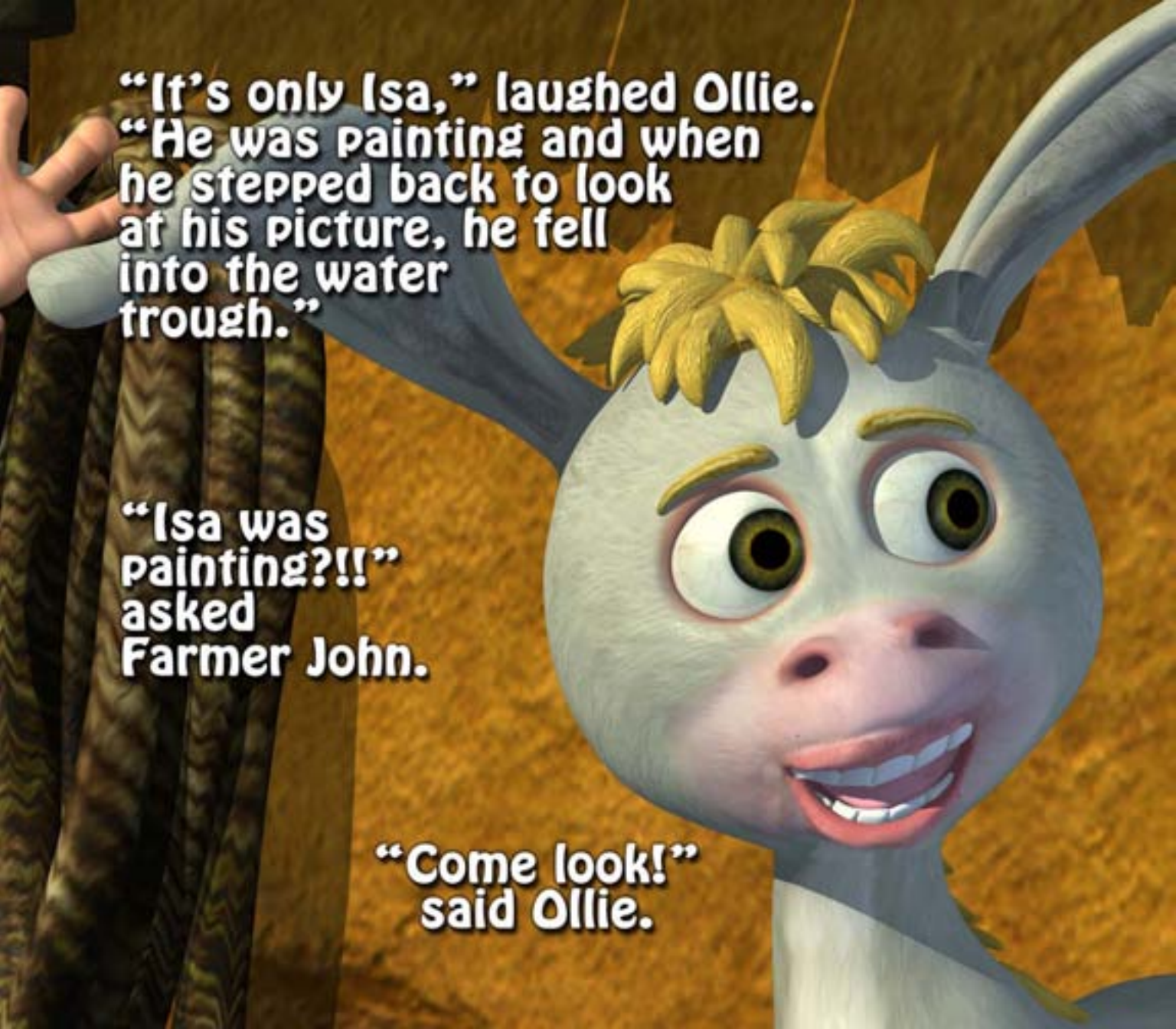
**Then there was

the stable.**

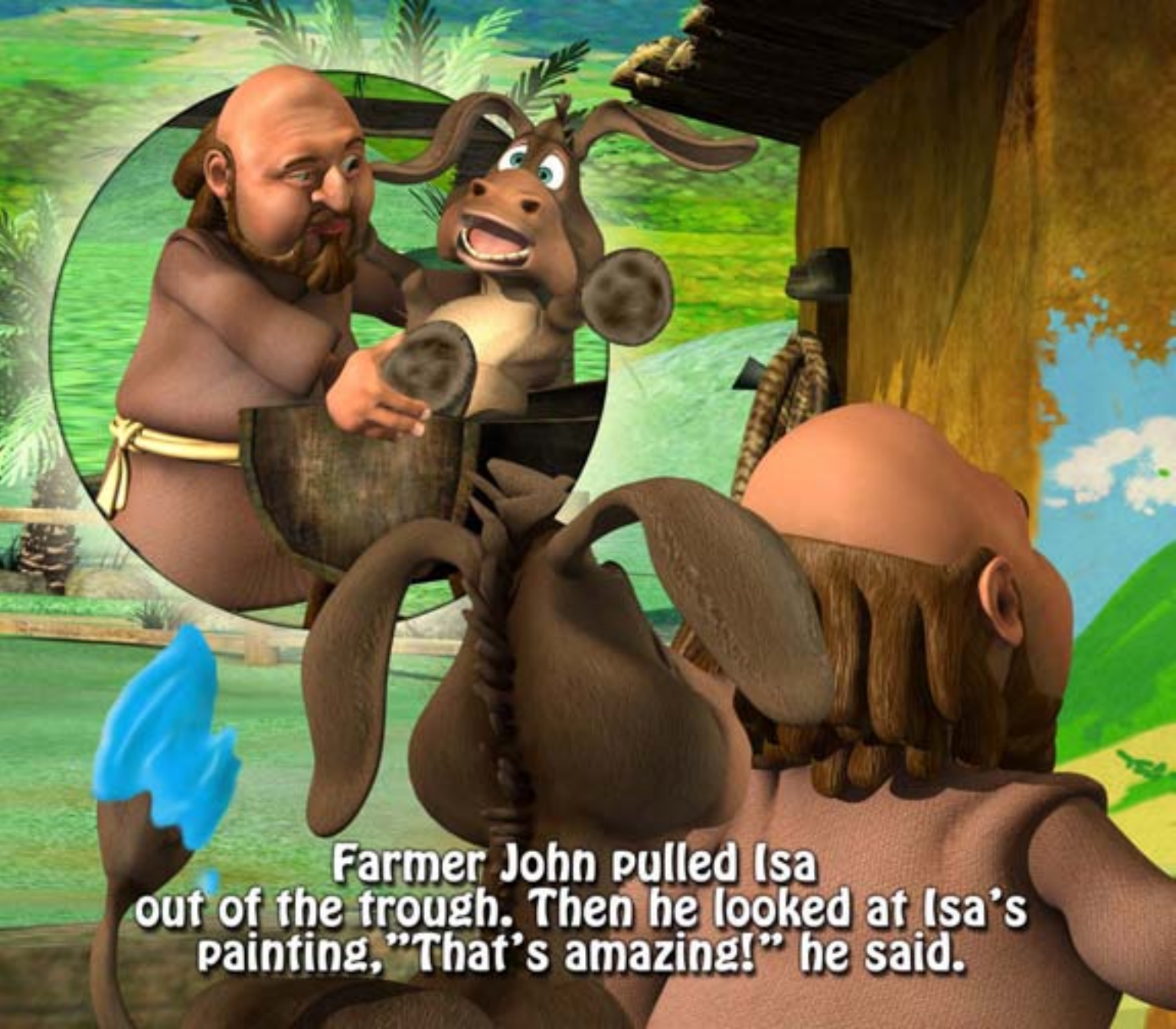
“I have no idea!” answered Jeremy.

“You could ask,” said Aunt Alana, “but do you think God is going to forgive you knowing you don’t plan to do better?”

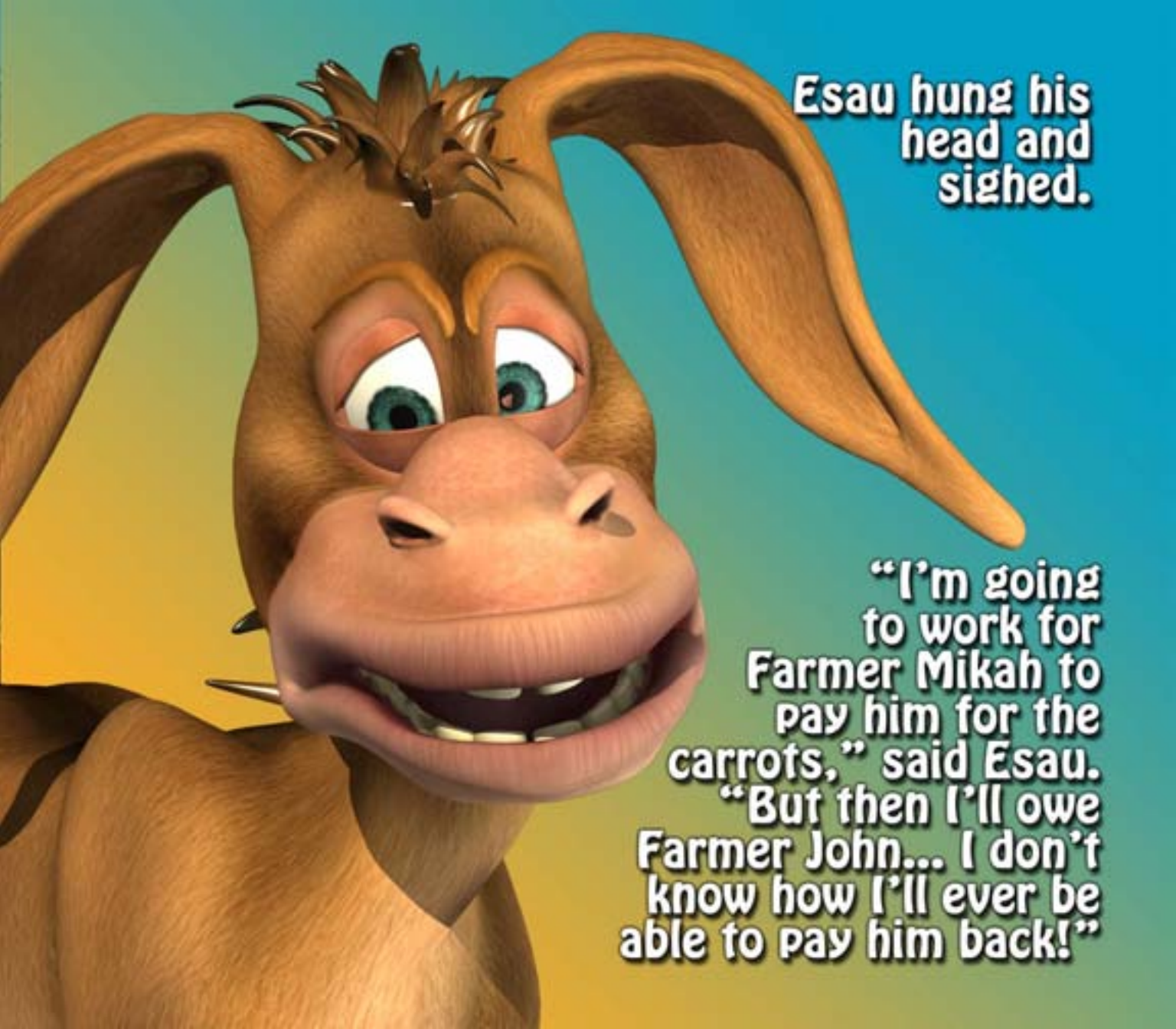
**“Ooh,” said Jeremy,

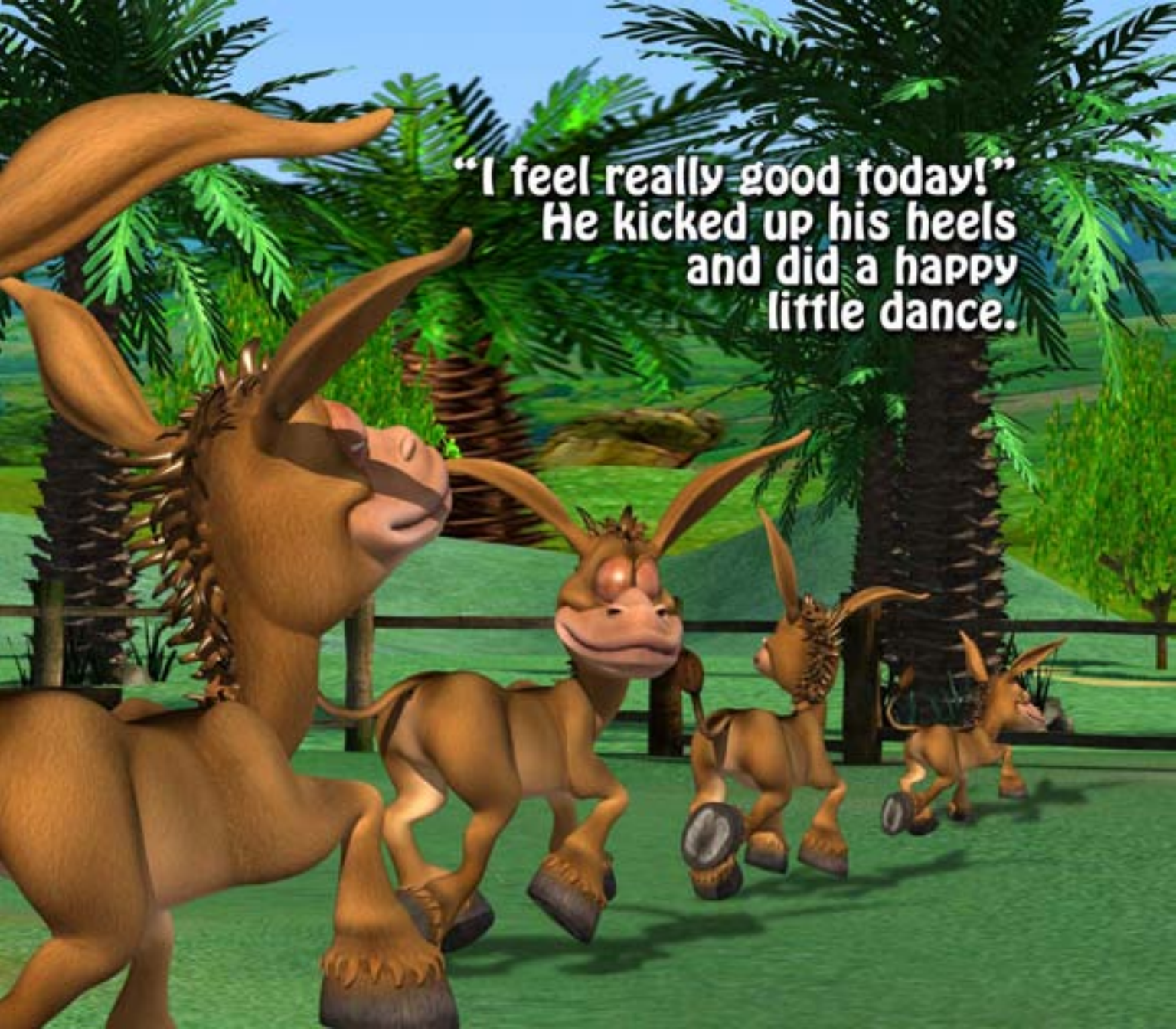
Esau was prancing around the corral, singing a happy tune.

little dance.**



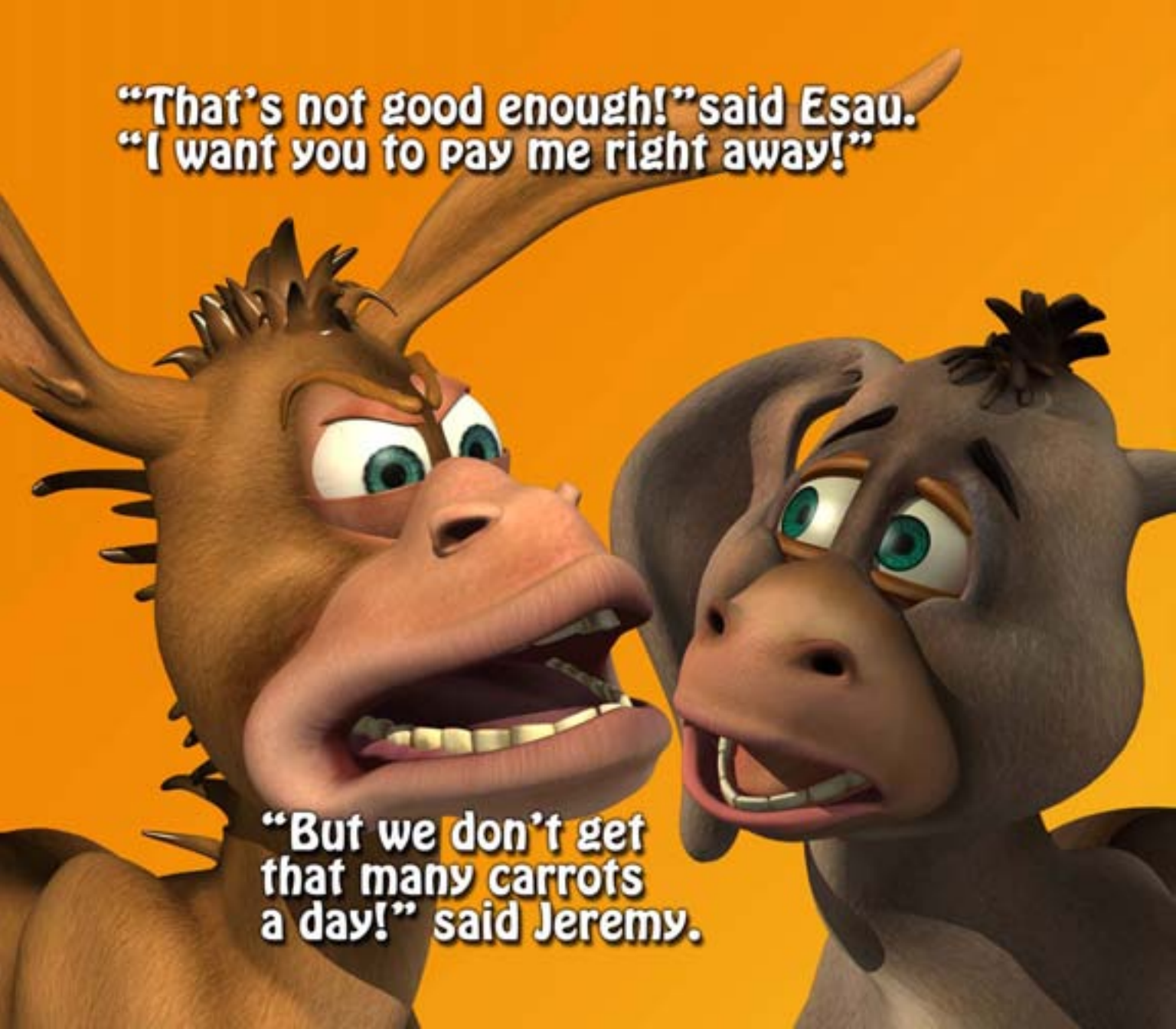
But later, when Isa and Jeremy were on their way to the fields, Esau came up to them.

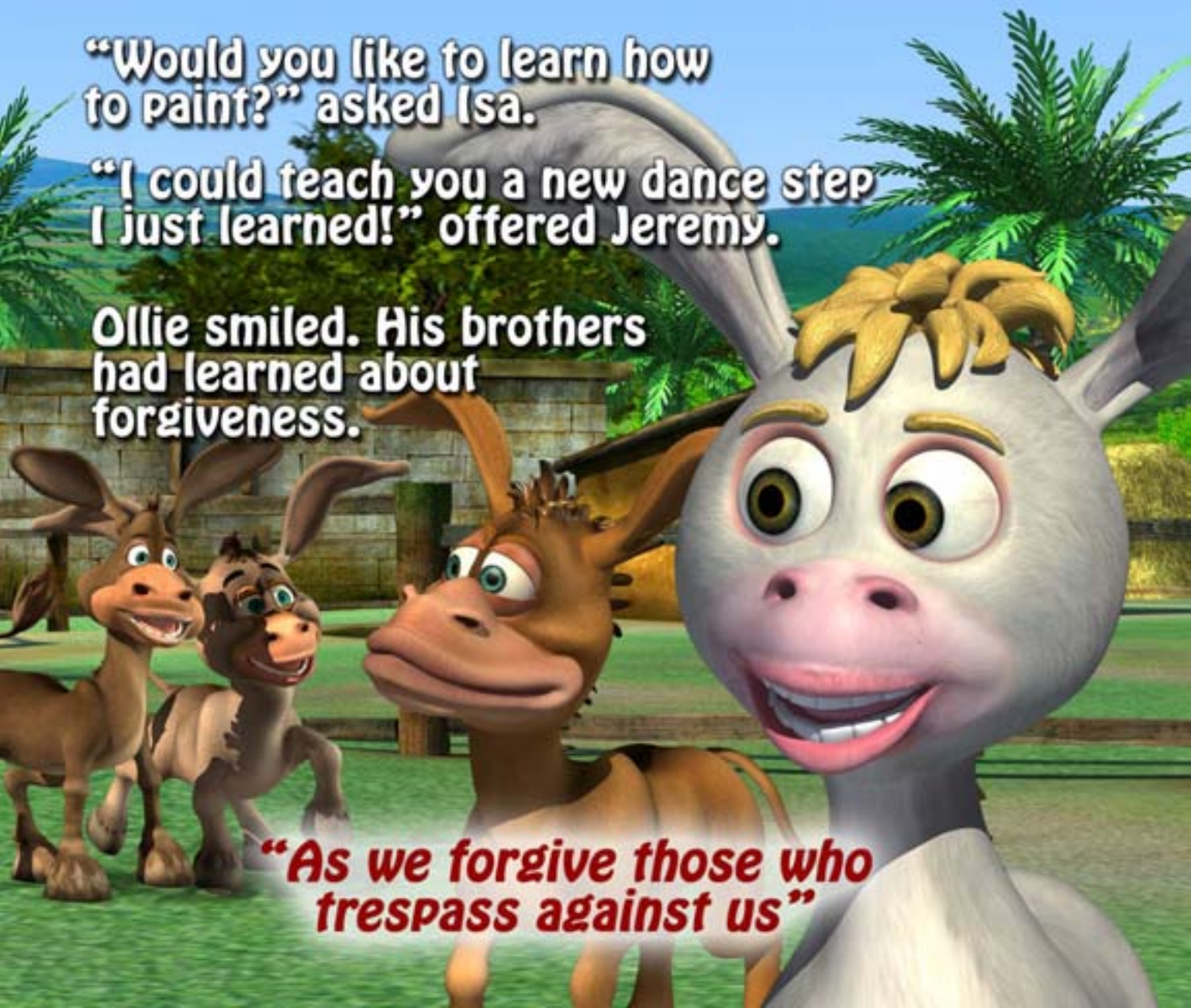

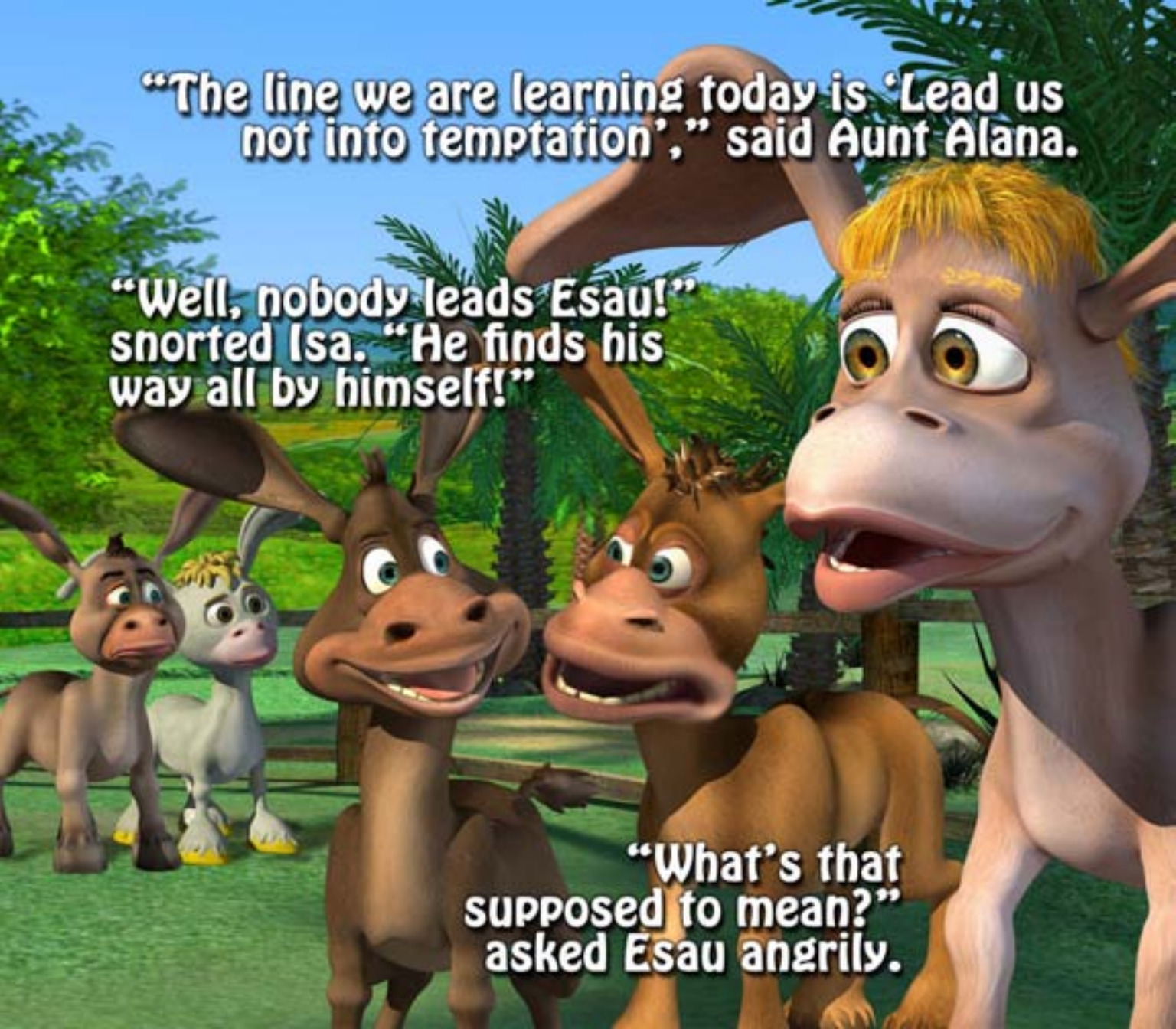

"And yes, Esau, I saw you take my carrots, too!"

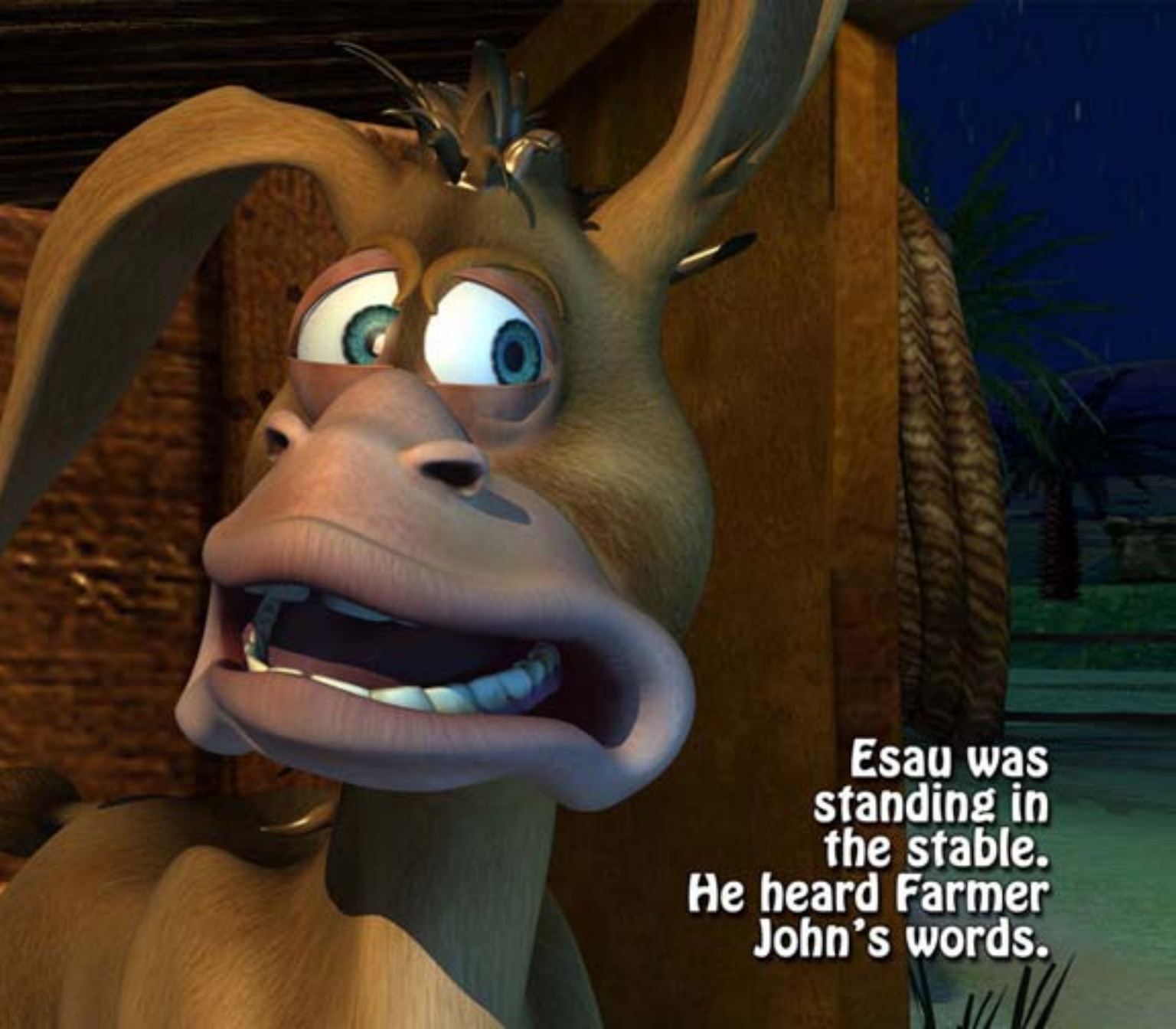


**“Well, YOU weren’t eating them!”
said Esau rudely as he trotted off.**



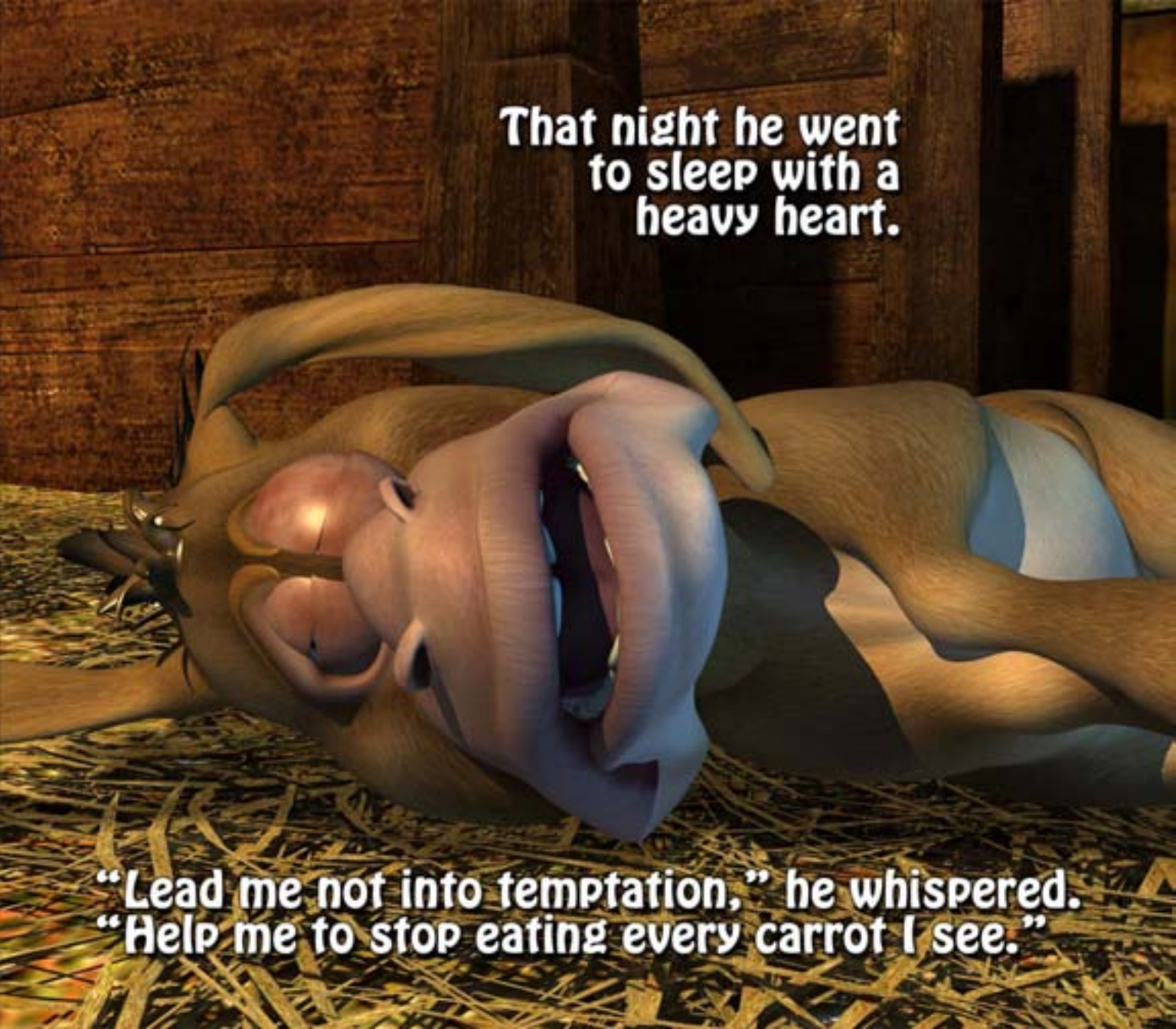
That evening, Ollie talked

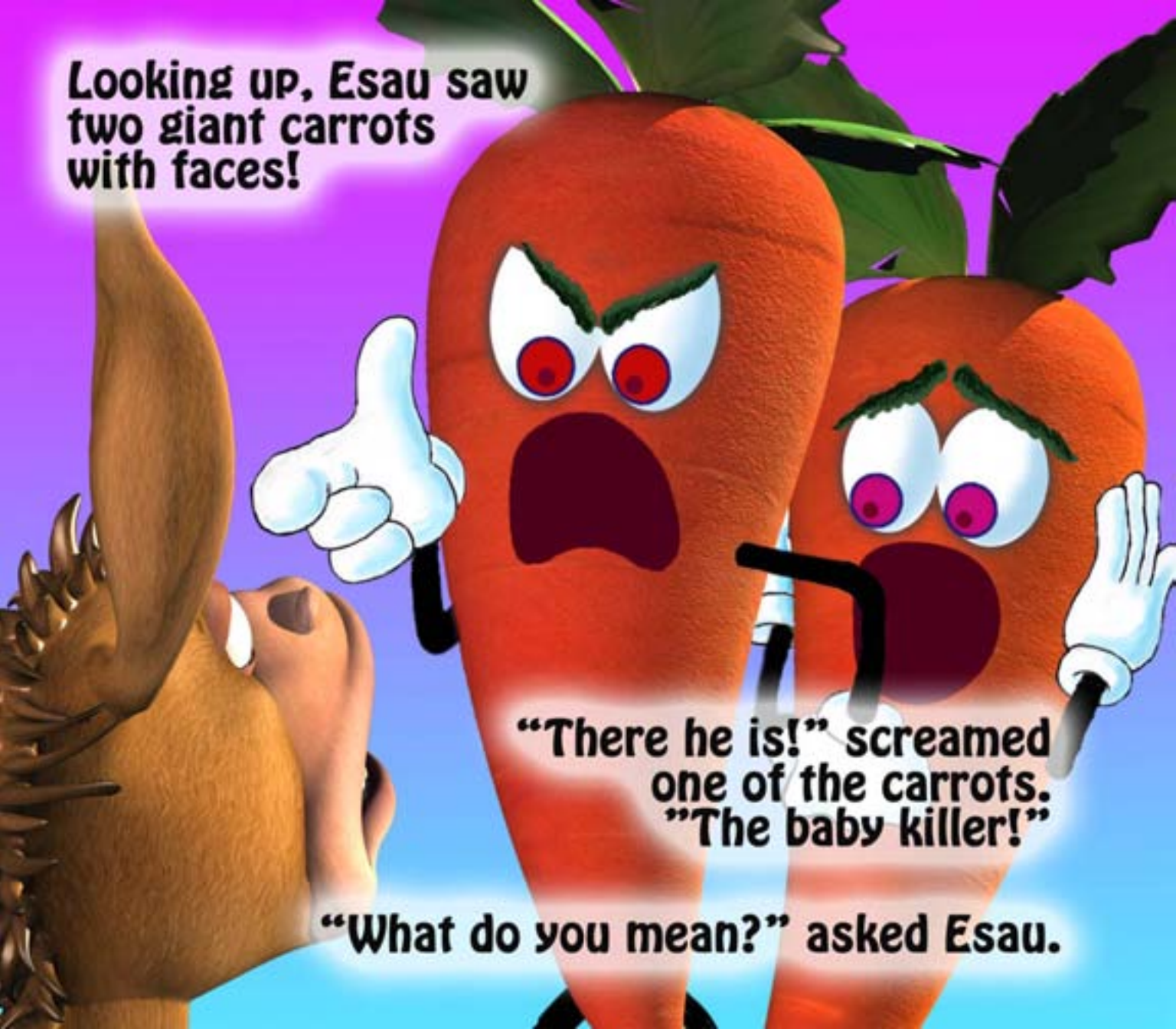

with faces!**

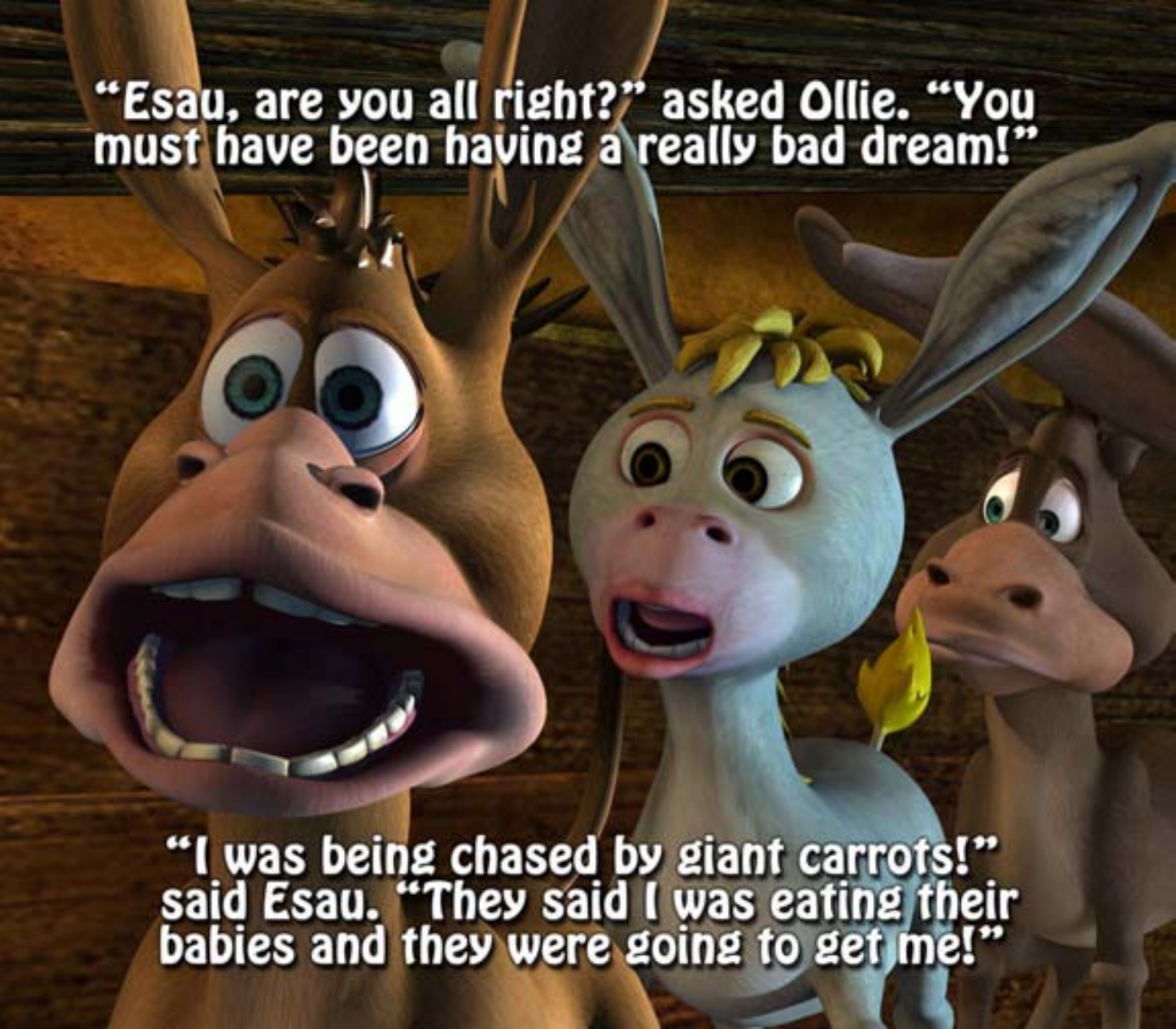
**"There he is!" screamed

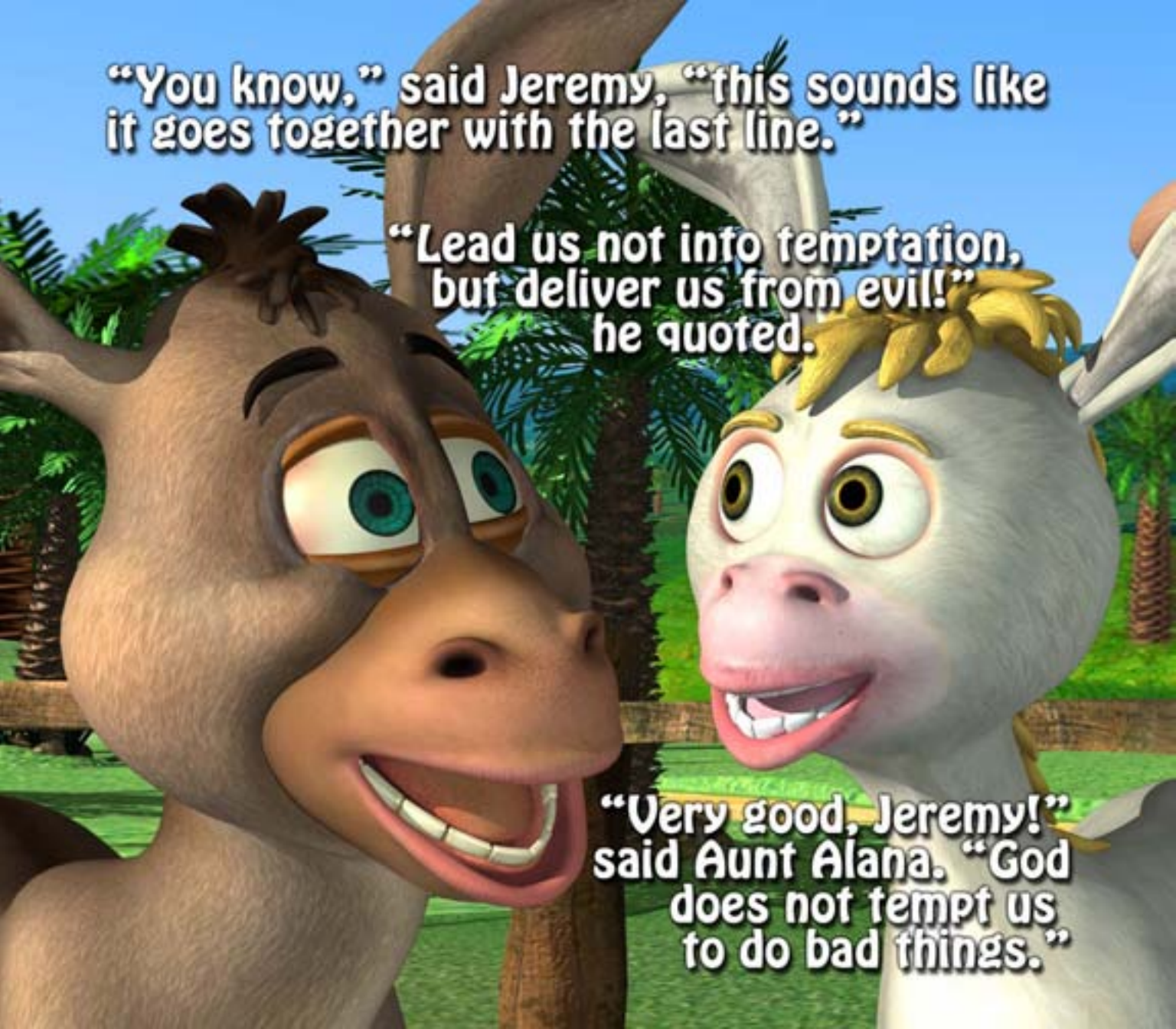

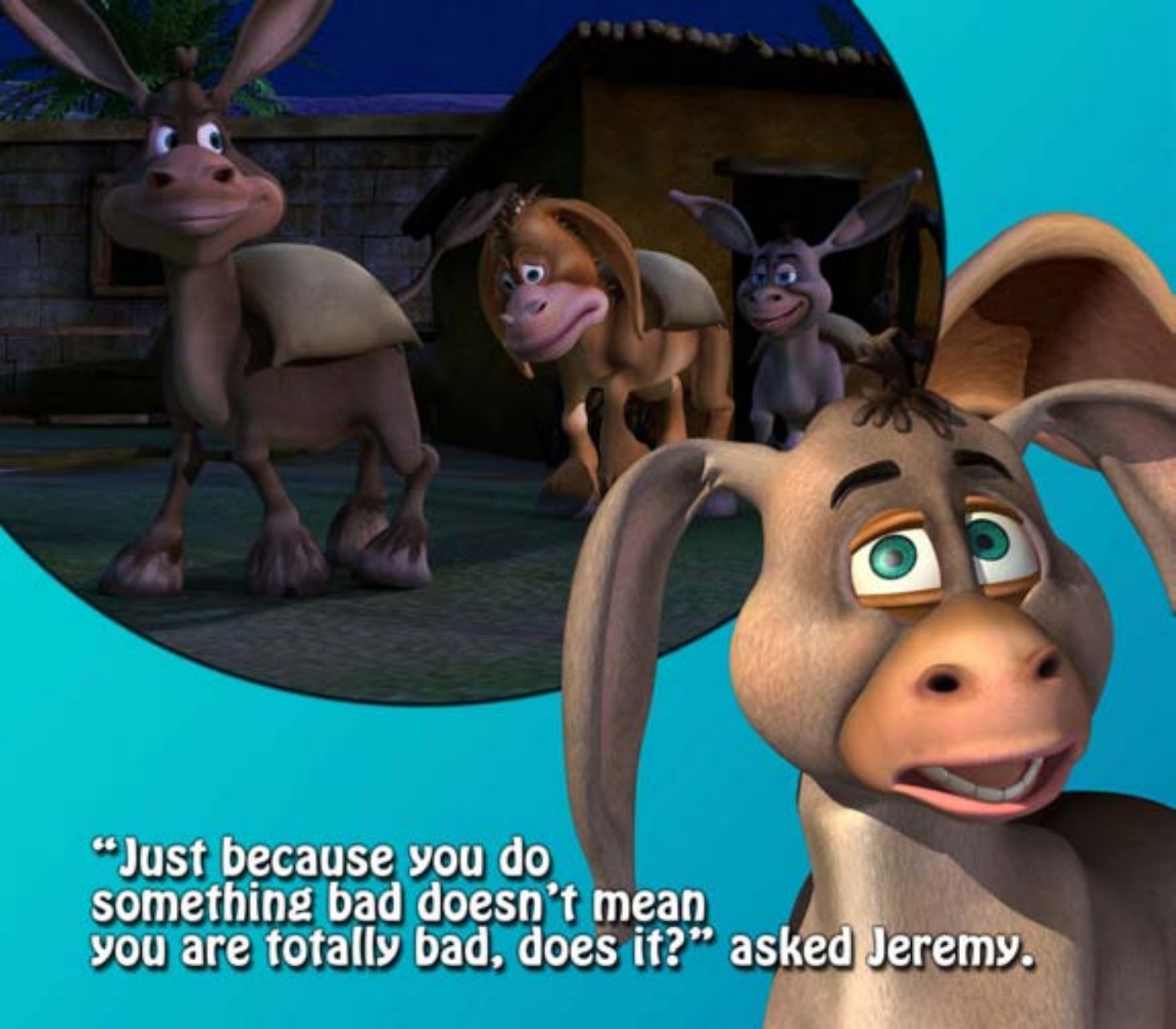

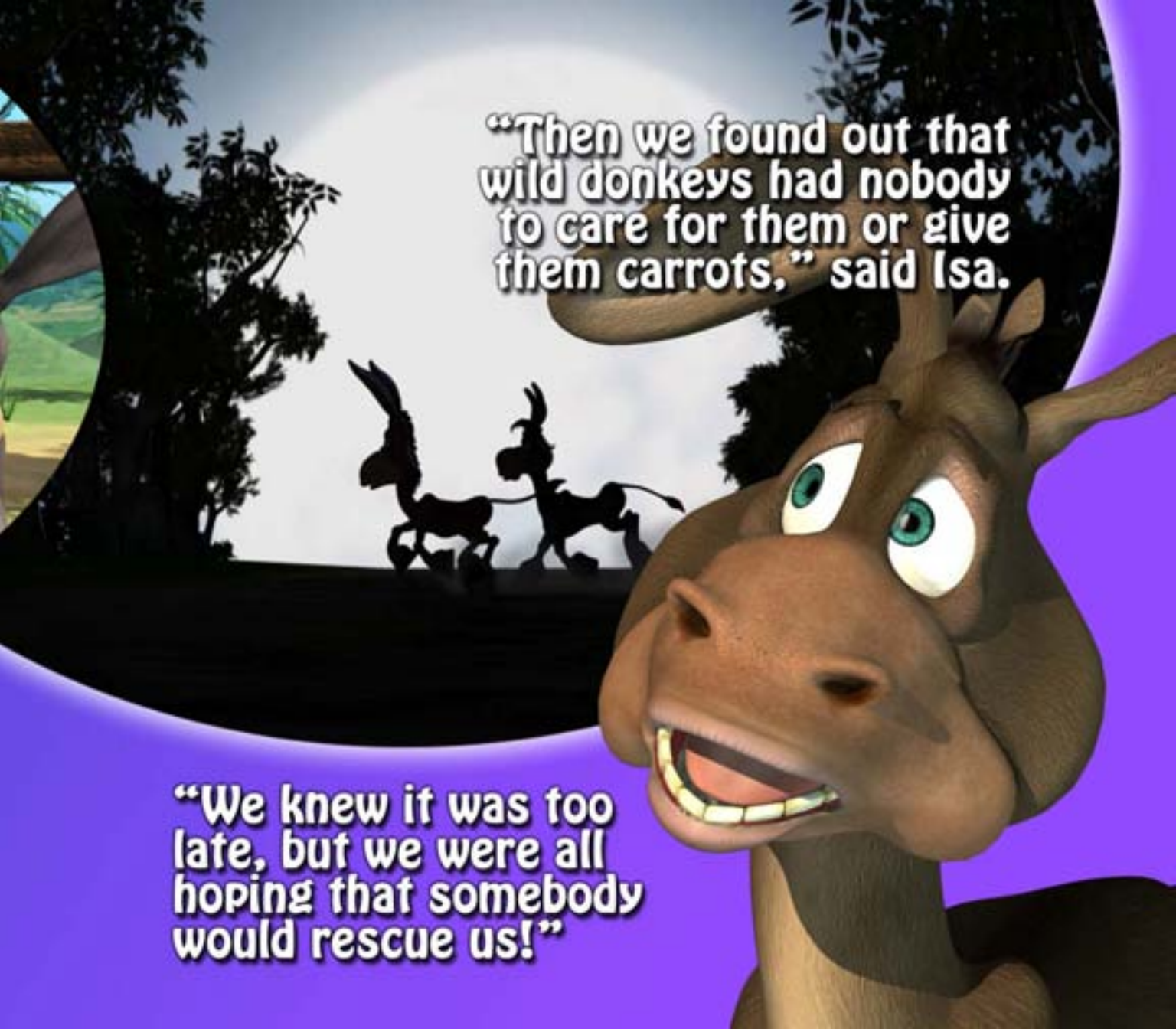
